
As the High Holidays approach and we unite in celebration and introspection, may the joy and sense of community of these holidays remain throughout the year, so that together, we can reach for the stars.

Facts & Figures: ENP Diminishes Gaps

ENP prides itself on its adherence to the utilization of external evaluations to help constantly improve the quality, content and direction of its programs. The most recent evaluation by the Myers-JDC Brookdale Institute found that ENP participant performance on matriculation exams has nearly reached that of the general Jewish population (63% vs 65%). In fact, a greater percentage of ENP participants (82% vs 75%) have passed the exam at a level that will enable them to enter practical engineering fields!

Of the 18,000 Ethiopian-Israeli teenagers in Israel, 3,464 will participate in ENP's Scholastic Assistance program in the 2014-15 school year. ENP's SPACE program offers intensive after school assistance with professional teachers in subjects including math, Hebrew and English, as well as social, emotional and nutritional support. This enables more and more youngsters to perform well in school so they can get into college and university and break the cycle of poverty which currently plagues the community- 49% of Ethiopian-Israeli children live in poverty.



At the start of this school year, to allay the welfare-related needs of ENP participants in advance of the school year, the Jewish Women's Renaissance Fund of the Jewish

Federation of Greater Washington donated 50 backpacks to ENP participants in Beit Shemesh so the kids could start off the year on the right foot. Additional, past contributors include Citibank Israel, YVEL- which donated sales proceeds to ENP to support ENP's successful programs- and others.

On the Front Lines: ENP and Stop the Sirens Campaign

Thousands of ENP's participants were affected by Operation Protective Edge, as was all of Israel. The Jewish

Federation of North America's Stop the Sirens Campaign helped ENP serve the greatest needs of the Ethiopian-Israeli community with generous support that enabled the provision of respite camps and back to school seminars. As war broke out, 292 Ethiopian-Israeli children from eight cities were offered respite in northern Israel where ENP participants enjoyed a two-night respite, participating in a wide variety of activities, from ice skating and a boat ride on the Kinneret to discussions about their concerns and fears with Ethiopian-Israeli counselors. Later in the summer, 824 Ethiopian-Israeli children and family members were given the opportunity to relax in Eilat. And as the



new school year approached, 570 Ethiopian-Israeli children participated in Back to School Workshops, getting "into the flow" of learning after the difficult summer.
