# **ENP Spotlight: An ENP Graduate Gives Back**

Currently an officer in the psychological unit of the IDF Ground Forces, Janet proudly states: "Without a doubt, ENP's program helped me to be where I am today."

Janet made Aliyah from Tigray, Ethiopia. At a young age, Janet's parents encouraged her to invest time and effort in her studies, so when Janet heard about ENP's SPACE

Scholastic Assistanc e P rogram, it was only natural for her to decide to participate. "Without a doubt, ENP's program helped me to be where I am today."

Janet is currently an officer in the psychological unit of the IDF Ground Forces and loves her job. When she speaks to Ethiopian-Israeli teens, she highly recommends serving in the IDF and to make every effort to reach the highest quality placements.

But a distressing reality prompted her to take action and turn to ENP as a resource: "R ecently, an article was published about the high rates of suicide of Ethiopian-Israelis in the army. After reading this article, I decided to go out into the Ethiopian-Israeli community and discuss this issue through presentations about what it means to be an Ethiopian-Israeli in a combat unit in the IDF.

"I couldn't stay quiet about what was happening with Ethiopian-Israeli soldiers and so I



turned to one of ENP's Youth Outreach Centers and offered to present a program on the issue, and how parents can help their children throughout their army service."

Through Janet's initiative at ENP's Youth Outreach Center with parents of ENP participants, she helped parents understand what their children are going through when they are drafted into the army and the difficulties they may have. It was an introduction for most of the parents to the army and exposed them to the issues that arise when their children are drafted.

Janet was surprised at the amount of parents that came to her program: "The response was amazing. There were many parents who truly wanted to be included in their children's live s in the army, but because of their lack of knowledge of Israeli society and institutions, they did not feel like they had the ability to be involved."

ENP has 14 Youth Outreach Centers, which serve some 1,000 youth throughout Israel. Among the critical work carried out is lessening the gap between parent and child. Read more about ENP's Youth Outreach Centers here.

### In the Field: ENP Regional Supervisors, an Extraordinary Resource

One of the factors that makes ENP so unique is the fact that it works hand in hand with the Ethiopian-Israeli community. From the highest echelons of its leadership to the most grassroots levels, ENP includes and involves Ethiopian-Israelis in every aspect of its work. Even the original decision for ENP to focus its efforts on children, risk-prevention and empowerment was made with the input of Ethiopian-Israeli leaders, who organized to create "The Representatives of Ethiopian Jewish Community Organizations" to serve as a united voice of the community in the ENP partnership with Jewish federations, the major Jewish organizations and the Government of Israel.

Of ENP's 15 staff members, ten are Ethiopian-Israeli professionals. The majority made the arduous journey from Ethiopia via Sudan, one came on Operation Solomon and another, having reached Israel at the age of one year old, is more Israeli than most Israelis. All are extraordinarily committed professionals who have dedicated their life's work to benefit the Ethiopian-Israeli community.

The seven Regional Supervisors utilize their knowledge and insights to ensure a superior program, serving as the eyes and ears of the investment mad e in this critical realm.
