Evaluation Reveals Boost in Performance for Multi-Year Participation in Scholastic Assistance Program

47% more Ethiopian-Israeli students receive a matriculation certificate as a result of participating in ENP Scholastic Assistance program. In 2007-2008, only 36% of Ethiopian-Israeli 12th grade students nation wide achieved matriculation eligibility. In contrast, 53% achieved matriculation eligibility after participating in the program for three years. (Myers-JDC-Brookdale Report, 2010)

Sara's Story

ENP's Scholastic Assistance Program offers more than just Scholastic Assistance. Often it transforms lives. See Sara's story below to see just one example of how ENP is enabling such transformations to take place.

One day, Sara,* a student on the ENP Scholastic Assistance program in Netanya, turned to her ENP counselor, Dembulo and shared with her the great distress that she was in. Sara had been suffering harassment and threats from a former boyfriend for a few weeks and was terribly afraid. Dembulo immediately spoke with school staff, in an effort to deal with the problem together. Sara was too afraid to tell her troubles to her parents but agreed to go with Dembulo to the police station to report the harassment. Dembulo, along with a class teacher and class advisor, followed the matter closely, and did not leave the child alone for an instant. Despite Sara's initial, staunch opposition they discussed the matter with her parents and conveyed what she could not: the seriousness of the situation, and the graveness of her the fears. The parents were deeply grateful to Dembulo.

After a number of days, the boyfriend, who was in fact also wanted by police for other crimes, was arrested. The young girl was finally free of fear. Sharing the secret that had weighed so heavily on her had revealed people who hurried to her side with sensitivity and love. She feels that the frightening episode strengthened her relationship with her parents and significant figures in her life.
