### The Need for ENP Today

The Ethiopian National Project's mission is to address the most pressing social and educational needs of Ethiopian-Israeli youth aged 13 to 18. By investing in today's youth, ENP is ensuring that the Ethiopian-Israeli community has a brighter future.

The Ethiopian-Israeli population, currently standing at 120,000, has the highest rate of poverty of any social group in Israel. 68% live below the poverty line. Their economic and social deprivation, combined with a crisis of cultural transition, has a hugely negative impact on every aspect of the lives of their children, of whom 16,000 are aged 13 to 18. ### The ENP Effect

- **Matriculation:** In 2007, 52.4% of Ethiopian-Israeli students who received Scholastic Assistance achieved their matriculation certificate eligibility, in contrast to only 37% of Ethiopian-Israeli students nation-wide. (Myers-JDC-Brookdale Institute Evaluation 2009)
- **Greater Self-Confidence:** 80% of students participating in ENP Scholastic Assistance programs reported a "great" or "very great" improvement in their self-image. (Branco-Weiss Evaluation, 2009)
- **Massive Reduction in Juvenile Delinquency:** Since the launch of ENP's Youth Outreach Centers in 2005, there has been a 60% decrease in the number of Ethiopian-Israeli youth with police files.

### Riki's Story

**Meet Riki:** an inspiring woman who is using her own experiences to improve the lives of Ethiopian-Israelis. Riki is the General Director of Hiyot, a non-profit chosen by the Ethiopian National Project to operate select Youth Outreach Centers in the north of Israel.

Riki and her family came from Ethiopia to Israel in 1984. During this time, an estimated 13,000 Ethiopian Jews traveled from Ethiopia and across Sudan in the hopes of reaching Israel; almost 4,000 died along the way.
